Headteacher's Note



I am a firm believer that there is nothing we cannot solve or improve by working positively together. Indeed, research tells us that the students who make the most progress are those who value education, and are supported in this by all parents/carers, staff and the community in which they live.

We are continuously focusing on how we can support students to make faster progress and achieve more.

September 2022 saw the introduction of our new Leadership team, who are focussed purely on supporting students at Stalham High School; We have also increased the number of staff working in our Pastoral Team, again providing additional and specialist support to students. To further support our students- and in preparation for the opening of our new SRB unit- staff have received specific training to support students' needs with further training planned for the following term.

I am really pleased to inform you that we will have five more permanent teachers joining us at the start of the Summer Term. These changes will help students reach their full potential and get the results they deserve.

In the last few months, we have also completed a full review of our curriculum. This has resulted in us moving to the two-year Key Stage 4 / GCSE programme, starting from September 2023. We have also introduced Work Experience for ALL of our year 10 students, enabling them to engage in the employment sector and learn about life outside of education.



Our Specialist Resource Base is on track to open in September (name to be announced soon). We have additional developments planned for the whole school including replacement flooring, improving heating system efficiency, new decoration, improved signage and a replacement screen and AV system in the school hall. We are also working on a business plan to enable our community to use our sports facilities at an affordable rate.

I would like to thank all of those Parents and Carers who responded to our surveys. We have taken all suggestions on board and made changes accordingly. Another survey, similar to the one shared in September, will be distributed in the Summer Term so we can monitor our progress and gain valuable insight from our community. There is a great deal to celebrate, as evidenced by the contents of this Newsletter, but as always, there is always room to improve.

I am really pleased to inform you that we will have five more permanent teachers joining us at the start of the Summer Term.

I hope you enjoy this Newsletter, we will be building and developing this triannual publication. As we do this, we will be looking for appropriate local sponsors for support. If this is something you are interested in, please get in touch.



Microbiology

Year 9 scientists have also been busy this term developing

called "environmental swabbing". The students had to

maintain bacteria-free conditions whilst taking swabs

their aseptic techniques during a microbiology investigation

biologists' most recent required practical. The experiment is called "Investigating the effect of a range of salt solution concentrations on the mass of plant tissue" and is part of their GCSE Biology course. In this practical, students must place 5 different potato tissue samples into 5 different salt solutions. The students must measure the mass of the potato tissue before and after it has been placed in the solution for 20 minutes. Using these results, students were able to determine the direction of water movement and also estimate the concentration of water inside the potato tissue. The investigation required students to practice a variety of scientific techniques as well as collaborating effectively as a team.

from disinfectant-treated areas and untreated areas. The microorganisms from the swab have then been cultured and grown in the Stalham High Science Preparation room. Students have been analysing the results to determine the effectiveness of the disinfectant used.

Clearest results are from Ella F and Phoebe L who have clearly collected a range of bacterial and fungal species from the untreated lab bench. Once treated, only one microbial colony was able to grow on the agar plate.

On Thursday 2nd February, Stalham High School participated in this year's 'Intermediate Mathematics Challenge' through UKMT. The competition is a chance for students to compete against other schools globally. Years 9, 10 and 11 were given the opportunity to test their mathematical prowess on a series of problems aimed at testing both knowledge and logic.

Gold, silver and bronze certificates are allocated based on a percentage scheme, and we are proud to announce that 7 of our students received a bronze award, 8 received a silver award and two received gold!

A special mention must go to Charlie and Bethany who both achieved the best scores in their Year group and also to Ewan, for getting the Best in School award with the highest score across all year groups!

Theatre Trip


Tuesday 21st February saw the first theatre trip for the new GCSE Drama group!

This minimalistic production was fun to watch and a brilliant learning tool for further exploration and discussion: a great starting point for evaluating live theatre.






Food Technology It has been a very busy time in the Food Department this

This term saw the launch of our very first Chess tournament, sixteen students entered and after a week of games, Jake W was declared the winner! Many students are already practicing for next term's challenge.









Panathlon Ten-Pin bowling Challenge

Stalham High School will be taking part in multiple trips on the 20th April as part of the School personal development curriculum.

The Year 7s will be visiting Bletchley Park to learn all about Alan Turing and the Enigma machine used to help us end WWII.

Year 8 are staying in school and will either be working with Smallpiece Trust on a STEM Flight engineering challenge, or working with Norwich City Community Sports Foundation on their Inspires programme which focuses on teamwork, resilience and communication skills.
