The Stalham Way -It's how we do things!

Recently we have been **working together** on the development of routines that help to further establish a respectful learning culture here in school. The development of 'The Stalham Way' (that we were pleased to see positively referred to by our recent OFSTED inspectors) looks to reinforce to students and staff the norms or behaviours we expect to see from everyone. From arriving at school, moving around school, starting and ending lessons, to presenting our work with **PRIDE** and remembering to get the **BASICS** right.

As a learning community, we each have a personal **responsibility** to contribute positively to the climate and culture of the school, to ensure we act in a way that supports each other's progress, development and **ambition**.

Having reflected on our core purpose 'To inspire, educate and empower' we also wanted to capture and promote our values to help everyone to get a sense of the collective behaviours we want to see at school. That's how we came to identify our 4 key values personal and community responsibility, ambition, working together and respect.

The PAD

In September we will be opening The PAD. The PAD is a Specialist Resource Base that supports autistic children with their learning. The main aim of the base is to support autistic children with their:

Personal development -Which encompasses life skills and personal development.

Academic success -We understand that some children need support to achieve their potential. We run high quality interventions that support academic success.

Diversity and inclusion are also promoted. We believe that autistic and neurodiverse children should be empowered in their neurodiversity by learning about how it is often a strength. We actively promote neurodiversity through teaching the children what autism is and how their brains work.



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Norwich Cathedral -Louis De Bernières

On the 18th April, a group of our Year 10 students were invited to Norwich Cathedral to attend a talk and workshop with Louis De Bernières, the author of Captain Corelli's Mandolin. The event was hosted by Norwich School and saw students create a fictional story from a picture based on an AQA GCSE question. Louis listened to one of our students share her story idea and received excellent feedback!

During this time, we had the chance to ask the author some questions. We enjoyed the cookies and we gained a great understanding of what to expect for our English Language exam."



WILLY RUSSELL'S



On the 28th June, 41 students across Years 7, 8 and 9 went to the Theatre Royal to see Blood Brothers. This phenomenal play by Willy Russell tells the tragic tale of twins separated at birth and brought up in different class systems. Inevitably, they meet as children, never knowing they are brothers until they reach adulthood.

The set design, as always, was magnificent, and it was great for students to see how design elements come together to complement the action; it's not all about remembering lines and moves! Costume, sound, lighting and music made the acting come alive on stage and, I hope, provided some inspiration for either future careers or for drama in general.

There is such superb acting in these West End shows, which are physically and emotionally draining. Hats off to Niki Evans, who played Mrs Johnstone again after a ten-year break. Niki came fourth in the X Factor in 2007 and had never even seen a musical herself when she was asked to play the character by producer Bill Kenwright. Niki is a superb example of a working class woman with buckets of determination and the resilience to fulfil her dreams: a wonderful role model for young people. Niki herself - and her character - was in tears in the final scene, which is so emotional. Some of the students cried at the tragedy, and we laughed at the comedy, but I think we all left the theatre with admiration and a greater appreciation of the arts.

The students enjoyed the show and behaved superbly. They were even praised by members of the public, which was wonderful! Thanks to staff and students for being excellent company and an appreciative audience.

MFL

This term, our Key Stage 4 students have been working hard on their grammar and tenses. After looking at the past tense in detail, as well as the topic of customs and festivals, our students have produced some excellent writing which combines both avoir and être verbs. These pieces were based on the 14th July for la Fête Nationale Française (or Bastille Day) which celebrates the French Revolution.

Year 7 have helped to recycle pre-loved French textbooks and resources and we have packed them to send to the charity Books2Africa. This charity promotes 'readcycling' and improves the quality of education in Africa by collecting, processing, shipping and distributing quality donated books, computers and educational materials. Instead, these materials equip institutions and community libraries and enable individuals to acquire knowledge and achieve their full potential in a globalised world. Did you know: 29 of the 54 African countries are francophone and so these French resources will of great use. Merci les étudiants!

FUTURE EVENTS

Year 9 French students have been signing up to the Paris 2024 trip in July next year. Students will be spending 4 days and 3 nights visiting famous landmarks, museums and locations such as the Louvre, Eiffel Tower, Arc de Triomphe, Tour Montparnasse, Sacre Coeur to mention a few, as well as having a day at Disneyland Paris.

This trip will also provide students with the opportunity to practice their French in an authentic setting and try the world-famous French cuisine.

Computer Science

Our Year 9 Computer Science students have been learning about primary memory and the differences between ROM and RAM. The students did some super group work with lots of problem solving to put together a memory pyramid.

Digital media

Our students have been developing elements for their interactive digital media projects; including making audio clips (mixing music and narrative) and animated GIFs. The group have made super progress and have produced some fantastic digital media!

Food tech

Our Year 10 students made a high-skill dish of panna cotta which incorporated making a custard, setting with gelatine, making a fruit coulis, making a tuile and working on our presentation skills in readiness for Year 11. Panna-tastic desserts Year 10!

GCSE Geography Trip to Cromer

Our Year 10 GCSE students took a trip to Cromer this term as part of their GCSE exam prep. During the morning, students did the Human section of their surveys. This included speaking to members of the public, measuring decibel levels on the high street and counting traffic flow. After lunch was the coastal research. The students used oranges thrown into the sea to measure longshore-drift and they also measured groyne height and effectiveness. Everyone worked really hard and represented Stalham High School brilliantly.

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Library

The Library has seen some big changes this term! New chairs and tables have brightened up the space and hundreds of new books have been added to the shelves! With help from The Norfolk Children's Book Centre, we will have a lovely new non-fiction section ready for September!

As part of the Year 11 Weekly Wellness Workshops, our students have taken part in a range of workshops including pizza making and a visit from therapy animals!

Pride workshops

As part of LGBTQIA+ month we were joined by Matt Herridge who spent a morning talking to the students about how to be a good role model and ally to the LGBTQIA+ community. Students found role models in their lives and reflected on how they identified comfort in those around them who support them when they are in need. Students spoke passionately about their families and friends and enjoyed the opportunity to reflect on the fantastic role models they have.









PD Day

For their Personal Development Day, our Year 7s visited Bletchley Park, the home of the codebreakers. It was at Bletchley that the German Enigma codes were cracked, helping to end WWII early. Our students learnt about the history of the site and had the opportunity to try their hand at cracking codes and cyphers of their own during a workshop to find out the name of Bletchley Park's spy. Students were also given the opportunity to use an original Enigma machine! The rest of the trip involved free time to explore the park, including Alan Turing's Hut 8, and the Bletchley Mansion!

Our Year 8 students stayed at school and took part in two different workshops.

The first group worked with the Smallpiece Trust on a STEM Flight Challenge Day which involved students designing and constructing an aeroplane powered by a propeller mechanism. During the task, students explored the physics of flight through concepts such as aerodynamics and forces.

Other students worked with Norwich City Football Club on their PL Inspires programme. This programme is focused on supporting the student's personal development and looking at how they can develop skills like communication, teamwork and resilience.

Our Year 9 and 10 students had the choice of three different experiences in London; Cultural, Creative and Sport.

The 'Cultural' trip included a 'WalkEatTalkEat' food tour of East London starting at Spitalfields Market, taking them on a journey through Brick Lane and into Shoreditch before ending up back at Spitalfields. Our students discovered where Jack the Ripper found his victims from a local pub opposite Spitalfields. They also learnt about the amazing artwork that can be found in this part of London including million-pound-selling coloured stalks of broccoli. They tasted a wide variety of food including Ghanaian chocolates, authentic Indian savoury snacks, renowned salt beef bagels, and some rather delicious artisan doughnuts. It was a wonderfully interesting and tasty trip!

Students on the Sporting London trip were taking in the sights by bicycle with a quick pit stop at the London Eye along the way.

The students on the Creative trip enjoyed visits to both The National Gallery and The Tate Modern. Highlights included Van Gogh's Sunflowers, The Ugly Duchess, lunch in Trafalgar Square and a sunny walk down the South Bank.

Eco Club

The Spring Term saw the creation of The Eco club, where our most environmentally conscious students met regularly to discuss ways in which the school and our community can be more eco-friendly. The summer term saw the planning of some exciting projects, including the new SRB sensory garden and a river clean on paddleboards!

At the end of June, the Eco Club paid a visit to Norwich Paddleboard Hire where they not only mastered paddle boarding but cleaned up any rubbish they found in the river along the way! It was a fun-filled hour which ended with lots of jumping in. It was great to hear about why it was important to keep our waterways clear, and everyone had a wonderful time!

















Aviation Club

On the 21st June, students from Stalham High's Aviation Club and the Air Cadets took part in an outing to the Norfolk and Suffolk Aviation Museum (Flixton, Bungay). Students were able to view (and board) many planes from the WW2 era all the way up to the Cold War and beyond! Flight simulators were very popular with the students. Some of them were even spotted boarding a helicopter to test their navigation skills.

The museum site also offered a unique opportunity for students to learn about local history. Excavated crash sites had been a source for many items to provide a memorial. Wreckage from the WW2 era was found in many places around Norfolk and Suffolk that the students could identify. Propellers, Merlin engines and fuselage parts to name a few.

Members of the school's club have been hard at work all year building wooden Hawker Hurricanes via balsa wood. Students were able to accomplish highly detailed models ready for flight. This trip was a fitting end to the academic year and rewarded all their efforts/free time given up to take part in Aviation Club.

National Teaching Award

Reverend Jackson

Charlie, Charlie, Sofya, Alice.

To Celebrate 50 years of working at Stalham High School, a group of students interviewed Reverend Jackson to find out about how life at our school has changed over half a century!

1. What is your first memory of this school?

I came from a big school. They had lots of tennis courts and golf clubs and over a thousand students. The overwhelming impression (of Stalham High School) was how friendly the children and the staff were. That was a big difference from what I'd been used to before.

2. Did you always want to work in a school?

Yeah I think so, I think when I was coming to the end of my sixth form and I wasn't sure what I was going to do, one of the teachers said you could go into insurance. That nightand this will sound strange- but I had a dream in which it was clear that I was meant to be a teacher; A teacher of children who found learning difficult, which I later went on to become. So from about eighteen it was very clear that this was what I was meant to go and do.

3. What did you enjoy most about your job?

Um, so many things really, I enjoyed seeing the students; I enjoyed the support of my colleagues; I enjoyed the friendliness of everybody and I enjoyed the fact that I was helping the children that found learning difficult to move along and advance.

4. What is your best piece of advice for students?

The advice I wish I'd been given at the time is to really make the most of the opportunities you're given- and try and get on with people. Nobody explained that to me when I was at school, about making the most of opportunities.

5. What inspires you?

What inspires me now? I wasn't expecting that! I think people inspire me, I've been very fortunate to meet lots of special people that have inspired me to try harder!

6. What are you most looking forward to when you retire?

Technically, I retired from full-time teaching in 2004. But by that time I was also a Church of England Priest that has kept me quite busy as well as invigilating in the schools. I will certainly continue with my church work in the future and I might come back next year to invigilate all your current Year 10s.



7. What jobs have you had within the school?

When I first came I was appointed as the head of the 'remedial department' as it was called in those days looking after the children that found learning difficult. That was later turned into SENCO and then I was promoted to the senior management team, which meant my responsibilities were for staff; in service training; planning all the staff development days and arranging for staff to go on different courses. Later on they asked me to do what they call 'day-to-day running' of the school which meant arranging lesson cover and asking colleagues to cover lessons. I was also in the end responsible for school transport and the busses. It was quite interesting.

8. What do you remember about the school when you first started?

We had about the same number of students then that we do now, about 500. It got much bigger during that time and then went down. We also went from 11-16 to 12-16 so children didn't come until Year 8 and then they changed it back again. In terms of buildings, I couldn't find my way here now today if I had to; it's much, much bigger. Another big change is that when I first started teaching the only compulsory subject was religious education. That's very different now!

9. How have exams changed while you've worked here?

My route to being an exam invigilator was strange. When I first started, teachers were responsible for invigilating exams. In 2004 they decided that teachers had more important things to do with their time and so they decided that outside people would come and invigilate instead. The head at the time was concerned that the students hadn't ever been tested with nonteachers before. So I said that as I was coming up to finishing full time teaching, if he was that worried, I would come in and help with the invigilating. So that's how I became an invigilator. Have exams changed? Well, because most of my time was with children who found learning difficult I didn't have much to do with exams, that was towards the end of my teaching, but exams are definitely longer now!
